

ORIENTATION PROGRAMME:INSIDE ME ORGANIZATION



On 12th September 2019, Inside Me organization had an orientation at Kamala Nehru College for all the volunteers of the Equal Opportunity Cell at 1pm. The orientation was organized by the Equal Opportunity Cell headed by Dr. Mohammed Israil. Inside Me is an effort and initiative to help blind children imagine, visualize, understand and draw the world around them. It aims to infuse knowledge and awareness in them through drawing and discussion by using their remaining senses.

Members of the Inside Me organization were present at the orientation who explained how they help the blind to visualize the unseen world around them and also expressed their vision for future. Videos and pictures were shown to the students showing how blind can also be taught to draw and how the visually impaired can be assisted to access and understand their surroundings through the medium of drawing. It could be seen in the videos and photos that the kind of satisfaction and joy the children feel after drawing is exceptional. Their eyes were filled with happiness and ecstasy .



A lot of girls stepped forward to volunteer to help the visually impaired and to work with the Inside Me organization. The kind of enthusiasm shown by the students to help show these tiny tots the world through art was wonderful. The members of the organization briefed the students how they can be benefited by working with the organization , what all things they are suppose to do while working with them and asserted that the classes will be held on Monday, Friday and Saturday from 4 to 5:30pm and the certificates will also also be provided for the same.



With this ongoing initiative of the organization, the visually impaired have become very comfortable with the volunteers, and benefits to the broader initiative are also beginning to show, reinforcing a vision that extends beyond this engagement. Using this as a stepping stone, Inside Me organization hopes to bolster its already entrenched social commitments to make visually impaired participate in the world around them .
